

As in the past, today's servicemen and women are sustaining injuries while serving in our country's armed forces. All injuries are serious, some resulting in the loss of limbs or vision. Not all injuries are readily visible, or may appear to be minor and of limited visible impact — but all have an effect on the Soldier, Marine, Sailor, Airman or Coast Guardsman. Recreational activities like those offered at the American Lake Veterans Rehabilitation Center and Golf Course, located adjacent to Fort Lewis, Washington, have a positive impact on the health and recovery of veterans and their families.

But, it's more than a golf course. It's a place of healing where disabled veterans with a common understanding experience physical and emotional rehabilitation. It's seen as a place of refuge to the wounded warriors we have the honor of serving.

American Lake Veterans Golf Course


After World War II, a golf course was added to the campus of the American Lake Veterans Hospital. But, in 1995, government funding for operation and maintenance of all VA golf courses was eliminated. Since then, volunteers have operated the American Lake Veterans Golf Course with no government financial assistance and no paid employees.

A group of inspired volunteers eventually created a non-profit corporation to assist with improvement, care and maintenance of the American Lake Veterans Golf Course—resulting in a place for all veterans to play.

Accomplishments

With tax deductible financial and in-kind donations, volunteers have made incredible strides in making the course more accessible to veterans with disabilities. The golf course is 100 percent ADA accessible, with a nine-hole golf course, three practice holes, driving range, and practice putting greens. The facility also includes First Swing and Blind Rehabilitation clinics which have all helped to make this the only course of its kind in the country. An activities shelter has been constructed. The new Rehabilitation and Learning Center provides an atmosphere of honor as veterans of all ages come together for physical activity and social interaction, regardless of their physical ability or emotional condition.
